NAPLAN 2022

The Year 3 and 5 students will be sitting the NAPLAN tests in Week 3 of Term 2. As part of the readiness activities, schools in Western Australia took part in the Nationally Coordinated Practice Test. Our students sat this test on 24 March 2022. Participation in the practice test provided students with another opportunity to become familiar with the question formats and platform functionality they will experience in NAPLAN Online 2022. Two practice tests were available: a writing test and an omnibus test. The omnibus test was given to our Year 3 students and was a combination of questions from conventions of language, reading and numeracy. The Year 5 students completed the writing test. Neither of these tests were scored.

By administering the test to both Year 3 and 5 students concurrently, it confirmed that the infrastructure of the school was capable of managing numerous devices being utilised at the same time.

CONGRATULATIONS ALDRICH!

Congratulations to Aldrich Frederic on his record breaking achievements during the recent 2022 Hancock Prospecting WA Junior Long Course Championships at HBF Stadium from 25—27 March 2022.

“Over the course of the weekend, we had a total of seven records broken! On Friday night, **Aldrich Frederic** (11yrs) of South Lake Dolphins clocked 1:00.55 for the Boys 11yrs 100m freestyle. This remarkable time broke the 11yrs WA All Comers, WA All Time and WA Residential Record.

The WA All Comers record was previously 1:00.82 held by Ruijie Zhou, an international swimmer set back in December 2019, while the WA All Time and WA Residential records of 1:01.83 were previously held by Jackson Anderson of St Hilda's, set back in April 2009.

Frederic went on to claim two more records on Sunday, breaking the Boys 11yrs 200m freestyle WA All Time and WA Residential records, previously held by Jack Wilson in a time of 2:17.12 set in October, 2013.

In a lucky coincidence, Jack Wilson, now swimming for North Coast and one highly decorated swimmer, announced the medallists on Sunday and was the first to shake Aldrich's hand after he claimed his records!”

Bull Creek Primary School P&C Container Deposit Fundraiser



10c per container is paid to the P&C for every eligible plastic bottle, aluminium can or carton.

Drop containers to the blue bin located in the bike locker compound which is open during school drop off (8.30am – 9am) and pick up (2.50pm – 3.10pm) weekdays – excluding school holidays.

Funds raised will be used towards school resources and programs run by the P&C.



FAQ's

- Why Scouts WA?
 - Scouts WA Recycling receive additional funding from the container deposit scheme to collect and sort containers. They also provide employment to long term unemployed, people with disabilities and as part of their youth development program, which means the school is supporting a range of broader community initiatives.
- Do I need to take the lids off?
 - Please take lids off – it ensures there is no liquid in the container, the containers can be baled and stored more easily by Scouts WA. Scouts WA can take lids off but this slows their sorting process. Please remove straws from juice boxes.
- Can the containers be crushed?
 - Yes, but it is preferable if they are not. All containers should be recognisable with labels intact to confirm they are eligible containers.
- Do the containers need to be clean?
 - Please ensure the containers are empty. It is preferable to rinse flavoured milk cartons due to the odour.

If bringing containers in a plastic bag, box, crate etc –take that container home with you, please do not leave it in the bike locker area.

Mental Health during the Transition from Primary to Secondary School

Is your child currently in Year 6?

If yes, would you be interested in helping us with our research?

The transition from primary to secondary school can be stressful for students, particularly if they face additional challenges (such as reading difficulties). This transition also coincides with a time of increased risk for mental health problems such as anxiety and depression.

Aim of the study: We hope to recruit current Year 6 students and their parents and survey them once a year (for up to three years) to better understand risk and protective factors for mental health during the transition to high school. While the main aim of the research is to understand how children with dyslexia navigate the transition from primary to secondary school, recruiting children without a dyslexia diagnosis to act as a comparison group is important. Additionally, this provides a valuable opportunity for a broader understanding of risk and protective factors associated with child mental health during the transition to secondary school.

Who are we? We are a team of researchers from Curtin University who are motivated to use our research experience to facilitate positive mental health for children with and without language and literacy difficulties.

What's involved? Children will complete a 45 to 60-minute online survey about their social and emotional wellbeing as well as a short reading assessment. A member of the research team will sit with your child to assist them with the survey.



Whilst your child is completing their survey, **you (the parent) will complete a 45-minute online survey** about parental mental health, child social and emotional health, and academic experiences.

As a thank you, each child will receive a gift voucher after each yearly assessment.
